Summary Highlights of Economic Conditions in the Nonrubber Footwear Industry in the Third Calendar Quarter of 1984 1/

U.S. production.--Preliminary data indicate that domestic production of nonrubber footwear amounted to 67.8 million pairs in July-September 1984, 18 percent less than that in the corresponding period of 1983 (table 1).

U.S. producers' shipments.--Preliminary data for the third quarter of 1984 show that producers' nonrubber footwear shipments amounted to \$1.06 billion, 5 percent less than that in the year-earlier period (table 2).

U.S. imports.--U.S. imports of nonrubber footwear totaled 211.6 million pairs in July-September 1984, a 49-percent increase over those in the corresponding period of 1983, and a record quarterly gain (table 6). The value of U.S. imports in July-September 1984 reached \$1.5 billion, an increase of 46 percent from the same period a year ago (table 7). Imports from Taiwan, the largest supplier, increased 53 percent during the period to almost 90.3 million pairs (valued at \$425 million). Imports from Korea rose 14 percent to 35.8 million pairs (\$244 million). Brazil's shipments continued to increase significantly during the third quarter of this year, increasing 102 percent over the corresponding period of last year to 32.9 million pairs (\$271 million).

U.S. exports.--U.S. exports in July-September 1984 totaled 2.4 million pairs (valued at \$25 million), representing an increase of 21 percent from those in July-September 1983 (tables 13 and 14).

Apparent U.S. consumption.--Preliminary data indicate that apparent consumption of nonrubber footwear in July-September 1984 rose 24 percent in quantity and 19 percent in value from the levels in the corresponding period of 1983 to 277.0 million pairs, valued at \$2.5 billion (tables 1 and 2).

Ratio of imports to consumption.--Third quarter data for 1984 show that imports captured a record share of the U.S. nonrubber footwear market. The quantity of imports accounted for 76 percent of U.S. consumption in July-September 1984, compared with 64 percent in the corresponding period of 1983 (table 1). In terms of value, imports made up 59 percent of the market in the 1984 period, compared with 48 percent during the 1983 period (table 2).

Prices.--During the third quarter of 1984, the Producer Price Index for footwear increased less than 0.1 percent and the Consumer Price Index increased 1.5 percent over the same period a year ago (table 5).

Employment and unemployment rate.--Preliminary data for the third quarter of 1984 show that employment amounted to 118,100 employees, 6 percent less than that in the corresponding period of 1983, and 11 percent less than that in the 1982 period (table 3). The unemployment rate in the leather and leather products industry for July-September 1984 was 14.7 percent, compared with 18.8 percent in the corresponding period of 1983 (table 5). 1/

Price range trend of U.S. imports.--A significant increase occurred in imported footwear valued under \$1.25 per pair, especially of women's and misses' plastic footwear. Sizable increases also occurred in the more expensive categories, consisting of leather athletic and women's and misses' leather footwear (table 9).

Imports of certain rubber footwear.--Imports of rubber footwear with fabric uppers and soles of rubber or plastics, another major sector of the footwear industry, including sneakers, joggers, and certain casual shoes and slippers, increased 39 percent in July-September 1984 over those in the year earlier period to 24 million pairs (valued at \$66 million) (tables 10 and 11). Approximately 60 percent of the quantity and 74 percent of the value of these imports in the 1984 period came from Taiwan and Korea.





Nonrubber footwear: U.S. production and imports for consumption, 1970-83




Nonrubber footwear: Ratio of imports to consumption, in terms of quantity, 1970-83




Nonrubber footwear: Quantity of U.S. production and imports for consumption, by quarters, 1982-84




Nonrubber footwear: Value of U.S. producers' shipments and imports for consumption, by quarters, 1982-84

in terms of quantity, by quarters, 1982-84




Nonrubber footwear: Ratio of imports to consumption,
in terms of value, by quarters, 1982-84





by principal sources, July - September 1982-84





by quarters, 1982-84




Average number of all employees engaged in the manufacture
