GENERAL INFORMATION

Background.-On July 31, 1978, the Department of the Treasury issued a countervailing duty order on imports of sugar from the European Union (43 FR 33237). On June 13, 1979, the Department of the Treasury issued antidumping duty findings on imports of sugar from Belgium, France, and Germany (44 FR 33878). On September 1, 2004, the Commission instituted a review pursuant to section 751(c) of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. § 1675(c)) (the Act) to determine whether revocation of the countervailing duty order and antidumping duty findings would be likely to lead to continuation or recurrence of material injury to the domestic industry within a reasonably foreseeable time (69 FR 53466). If the Commission makes an affirmative determination with respect to the countervailing duty order or any of that antidumping duty findings, the order or finding will remain in place. If the Commission makes a negative determination with respect to the order of any of the findings, that Department of Commerce will revoke the order or finding.

<u>Due date of questionnaire(s)</u>.--Return the completed questionnaire(s) to the United States International Trade Commission by no later than May 16, 2005. Use of an overnight mail service may be necessary to ensure that your response actually reaches the Commission by May 16. Please ensure the completed questionnaire is sent to the attention of Jai Motwane. Return <u>only one</u> copy of the completed questionnaire(s), but please keep a copy for your records so that you can refer to it if the Commission staff contacts you with any questions during the course of the reviews.

<u>Service of questionnaire response(s)</u>.--In the event that your firm is a party to these reviews, you are required to serve a copy of the questionnaire(s), once completed, on parties to the proceedings that are subject to administrative protective order (see 19 CFR § 207.7). A list of such parties is maintained by the Commission's Secretary and may be obtained by calling 202-205-1803. A certificate of service must accompany the copy of the completed questionnaire(s) you submit (see 19 CFR § 207.7).

<u>Confidentiality</u>.--The commercial and financial data furnished in response to the enclosed questionnaire(s) that reveal the individual operations of your firm will be treated as confidential by the Commission to the extent that such data are not otherwise available to the public, and will not be disclosed except as may be required by law (see 19 U.S.C. § 1677f). Such confidential information will not be published in a manner that will reveal the individual operations of your firm; however, nonnumerical characterizations of numerical business proprietary information (such as discussion of trends) will be treated as confidential business information only at the request of the submitter for good cause shown.

<u>Verification</u>.--The information submitted in the enclosed questionnaire(s) is subject to audit and verification by the Commission. To facilitate possible verification of data, please keep all your workpapers and supporting documents used in the preparation of the questionnaire response(s).

Release of information.--The information provided by your firm in response to the questionnaire(s), as well as any other business proprietary information submitted by your firm to the Commission in connection with the reviews, may become subject to, and released under, the administrative protective order provisions of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. § 1677f) and section 207.7 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure (19 CFR § 207.7). This means that certain lawyers and other authorized individuals may temporarily be given access to the information for use in connection with these reviews or other import-injury investigations or reviews conducted by the Commission on the same or similar merchandise; those individuals would be subject to severe penalties if the information were divulged to unauthorized individuals.

INSTRUCTIONS

Answer all questions.—Do not leave any question or section blank unless a questionnaire expressly directs you to skip over certain questions or sections. If the answer to any question is "none," write "none." If information is not readily available from your records in exactly the form requested, furnish carefully prepared estimates—designated as such by the letter "E"—and explain the basis of your estimates. Answers to questions and any necessary comments or explanations should be supplied in the space provided or on separate sheets attached to the appropriate page of the questionnaire(s). If your firm is completing more than one questionnaire in connection with this review (i.e., a producer, importer, purchaser, and/or foreign producer questionnaire), you need not respond to duplicated questions in the questionnaires.

<u>Consolidate all establishments in the European Union, and in Belgium, France and Germany individually.</u>—Report the requested data for your establishment(s) located in the European Union. Report separately for establishments in each EU member-state. Firms operating more than one establishment in any EU member-state should combine the data for all establishments in that state into a single report.

DEFINITIONS

<u>Sugar</u>.--Raw and refined sugar, with the exception of specialty sugars (e.g., cones, hats, pearls, loaves).

The countervailing duty order on sugar from the European Union includes blends of sugar and dextrose, a corn-derived sweetener, containing at least 65 percent sugar. Exporters should report exports of such blends from the European Union in their questionnaire response. The merchandise subject to the countervailing duty order on sugar from the European Union is currently classifiable under subheadings 1701.11.05, 1701.11.10, 1701.11.20, 1701.11.50, 1701.12.05, 1701.12.10, 1701.12.50, 1701.91.05, 1701.91.10, 1701.91.30, 1701.99.05, 1701.99.10, 1701.99.50, 1702.90.05, 1702.90.10, 1702.90.20, 2106.90.42, 2106.90.44, and 2106.90.46 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTS).

The antidumping findings on sugar from Belgium, France, and Germany exclude homeopathic sugar pellets meeting the following criteria: 1) composed of 85 percent sucrose and 15 percent lactose; 2) having a polished, matte appearance, and more uniformly porous that domestic sugar cubes; 3) produced in two sizes of 2 mm and 3.8 mm in diameter. Exporters of sugar should exclude exports of any such homeopathic pellets from Belgium, France, or Germany from their questionnaire response. The merchandise subject to the antidumping findings on sugar from the Belgium, France, and Germany is currently classifiable under subheadings 1701.11.05, 1701.11.10, 1701.11.20, 1701.11.50, 1701.12.05, 1701.12.10, 1701.12.50, 1701.91.05, 1701.91.10, 1701.91.30, 1701.99.05, 1701.99.10, 1701.99.50, 1702.90.05, 1702.90.10, 1702.90.20, 2106.90.42, 2106.90.44, and 2106.90.46 of the HTS.

European Union (EU).--All 25 current member-states of the EU, including Austria, Belgium, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, the Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, and the United Kingdom.

DEFINITIONS--Continued

Pre-expansion EU (EU-15).--The 15 member-states of the EU prior to its expansion to 25 members on May 1, 2004. The EU-15 includes Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, and the United Kingdom.

<u>New member-states of the EU (EU-NMS)</u>.--The 10 new member-states of the European Union, as of May 1, 2004. The NMS include Cyprus, Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia, and Slovenia.

<u>Firm</u>.--An individual proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, association, corporation (including any subsidiary corporation), business trust, cooperative, trustee in bankruptcy, or receiver under decree of any court.

Related firm.--A firm that your firm solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled; a firm that solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled your firm; and/or a firm that was solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled by a firm that also solely or jointly owned, managed, or otherwise controlled your firm.

Establishment.--Each facility of a firm in the European Union involved in the production of sugar (as defined above), including auxiliary facilities operated in conjunction with (whether or not physically separate from) such facilities.

<u>United States</u>.--For purposes of this review, the 50 States, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the District of Columbia.

<u>Importer</u>.--Any person or firm engaged, either directly or through a parent company or subsidiary, in importing sugar (as defined above) into the United States from a foreign manufacturer or through its selling agent.

<u>Average production capacity</u>.--The level of production that your establishment(s) could reasonably have expected to attain during the specified periods. Assume normal operating conditions (i.e., using equipment and machinery in place and ready to operate; normal operating levels (hours per week/weeks per year) and time for downtime, maintenance, repair, and cleanup; and a typical or representative product mix).

DEFINITIONS--Continued

<u>Production</u>.--All production in your establishment(s) in the European Union, including production consumed internally within your firm.

Shipments.--Shipments of sugar produced in your establishment(s) in the European Union.

Shipment quantities.--Quantities reported should be net of returns.

<u>Shipment values</u>.--Values reported should be net values (i.e., gross sales values less all discounts, allowances, rebates, prepaid freight, and the value of returned goods) in <u>U.S. dollars</u>, f.o.b. your point of shipment in the European Union.

Home market commercial shipments.--Shipments within the European Union, other than internal consumption and transfers to related firms.

<u>Home market internal consumption/transfers to related firms</u>.--Shipments made to related firms within the European Union, including sugar consumed internally by your firm.

<u>Export shipments</u>.--Shipments to destinations outside the European Union, including shipments to related firms.

<u>Inventories</u>.--Finished goods inventory, not raw materials or work-in-progress.
