3,3'-Dichlorobenzidine dihydrochloride (CAS No. 612-83-9) (provided for in subheading 2921.59.80)

III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject product is used as an intermediate for the production of pigments, primarily those used in printing inks. It is imported from China and India and, through mid-2012, from Japan. Although the title of the bill has no legal significance, it should be noted that the proposed action is a renewal of a temporary duty reduction, rather than an extension of an existing reduction as the title of the bill as written says. In addition to extending the temporary duty reduction, the bill would also change the rate of duty of the Chapter 99 provision from 5.9 percent to 3.8 percent.

A BILL

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—Heading 9902.25.73 of the Har-
7 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States (relating to
8 3,3'-Dichlorobenzidine dihydrochloride ([1,1'-biphenyl]-
9 4,4'-diamino, 3,3'-dichloro-)) is amended—

1 (1) by striking “5.9%” and inserting “3.8%”;

2 and

3 (2) by striking the date in the effective period

4 column and inserting “12/31/2015”.

5 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by

6 subsection (a) applies to goods entered, or withdrawn from

7 warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after

8 the date of the enactment of this Act.

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
