Rockwood Holdings, Inc., a US corporation based in Princeton, NJ, and its subsidiary Rockwood Lithium oppose Senate Bills 3153 and 3152, which would suspend import duties on lithium carbonate and lithium chloride, used in a range of industrial products, including batteries, pharmaceuticals and lubricants. We oppose the bills for three reasons:

- The bill will have a negative impact on our domestic production and sales of lithium carbonate just as we are starting up our expanded lithium carbonate production facilities in Nevada and North Carolina. The expansion of these facilities was funded in part by a grant from the Department of Energy. Rockwood's Nevada site is the only source of lithium carbonate in the United States, and the grant and expansion program are intended to make this site more competitive on a global basis.
- The bills would effectively penalize countries that have good relations with the US and have negotiated free trade agreements with our nation, in particular Chile, where Rockwood produces a large portion of its lithium carbonate and lithium chloride. Rockwood Lithium upgrades these basic products into value-added compounds at its facilities in North Carolina, Nevada, Tennessee and Texas, and the bills would disadvantage us.
- The bills in particular would give an unfair advantage to China, where we already see an increase in lithium manufacturing and more active imports of lithium products into the United States. These imported lithium materials from China will compete directly with domestically produced lithium materials. This will happen during a critical time of expanded use of these materials in domestically produced lithium ion batteries for the electric vehicle and energy storage markets.
